- Rev. Sebastian Walshe, O.Praem. ('94), published two books, one on the parables of Jesus and the other on the Sacrament of Matrimony.
- Will Bertain ('13) was appointed assistant headmaster at St. Jerome Institute, a newly opened classical high school in Washington, D.C.

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

"You can study all of the things that you want foreign policy-wise to try to prepare for these types of positions,"



Pandemic

Amidst building anxiety concerning the novel coronavirus, President McLean announced on March 17 that the two campuses of Thomas Aquinas College would be closing for the safety of the students and the larger community. This news came as a blow to the students who bid hasty farewells before evacuating their respective campuses. But they rallied and ended the year strong, despite the drawbacks of lagging internet, online study groups, and socially distanced classes. By the grace of God, the College opened its doors to students again in the fall, albeit with its fair share of difficulties. In order to ensure the safety of the College community, new measures were necessary, including:

- Working closely with public health officials in both California and Massachusetts to create a safe re-opening plan;
- Investing in nearly 200 popup tents, outdoor tables, and chairs to accommodate outside classes on the California campus;
- Supplying PPE for all students and faculty;
- Implementing the ever-changing food-service guidelines on both campuses;
- Testing students before they returned to campus and again soon after their arrival;
- Frequent testing of students and faculty;
- Restricting student interactions off-campus;
- Making improvements to both campuses to encourage students to remain on campus, including renovating the California ponds and hiking trails, and renovating Tracy Student Center in New England.



Campus Developments

Over its 49-year history, Thomas Aquinas College has grown from a school housing 33 students and 4 faculty to one of the best liberal arts colleges in America, boasting two campuses, 459 students, and close to 50 faculty members. This year culminated in a major development for the California campus: Construction began on the final building outlined in the campus' master plan, the Pope St. John Paul II Athletic Center.







Admissions

With the addition of this year's freshmen, the student body on the College's newly opened East Coast campus has effectively doubled. And as Thomas Aquinas College, New England, continues to grow, so, too, does the College's reach. Interest in the new campus is great, as marked by high enrollment at the 2020 High School Summer Program (despite COVID-19 limitations). The College's student-retention rate — 89 percent, compared to the national average of 78 percent — augurs well for the future. The Admissions Office expects to reach full capacity on both campuses by 2030.






Friends Week of Giving Appeal
