Our benefactors, too, have been steadfast in their charitable giving during the 2021 fiscal year, making it possible for so many of our students to benefit from the life-changing program of genuine Catholic liberal education that we offer. May God reward these generous souls!

Because of the pandemic, the year was less eventful than most, but it closed with joyful celebrations for two classes of graduates — the Class of 2021 and their immediate predecessors who had been prevented by the pandemic from taking part in our customary commencement exercises.

In addition, four more of our alumni were ordained to the priesthood: one for the Diocese of Monterey, one for the Archdiocese of St. Louis, one for the Western Province of the Dominican Order, and one — our first — for our home diocese, the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. They join the ranks of our alumni priests, now totaling 78. May the Lord bless them all and keep them ever-faithful to Himself and to the Church.



Their recently acquired New England campus chapel has gone through a significant renovation that gives it a distinctly Catholic look, complete with an ornate richly carved 23-karat gold-leaf altar and reredos. This is a big change, considering the chapel had been built for non-denominational services, formerly belonging to the Archifeld Mt. Hermon School, founded by a 19th-century evangleit named Dwight Moody. The new sanctury shines, impressing upon all who visit a new visual focus, improving on the old academic Gothic shell while building upon a new hierarchy of visuals. The sanctury vall is now awash in gold, symbolic of heaven, displaying a splash of smillight and golden stars made with beautiful stenedit echniques.











Alumni Achievements


While the College's immediate goal is to provide its students with an excellent liberal education, its ultimate end is to participate in God's work to renew the face of the earth by sending into the world graduates whose minds and hearts have been formed according to the mind and heart of Christ. Thus prepared and serving in their varied professions and vocations, the College's alumni are a tremendous force for good in the Lord's work to transform the world and build up His church. Below are just a few examples of the good work our alumni, new and old, accomplished in Fiscal Year 2021.



Cynthia (Six '77) Montanaro is a Third Order Carmelite, wife, mother, and librarian. In 2020 she published *Diary of a Country Carmelite: A Year in the Garden of Carmel,* which offers a look into the lives of dozens of Carmelite saints, less known than the renowned St. Thérèse of Lisieux and St. John of the Cross, but nonetheless eminently holy. In this volume the author also recounts her experience of life and prayer in the country.

Rev. Michael Masteller ('13) offered a Mass of Thanksgiving at his alma mater following his ordination for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Rev. Masteller's first assignment is at St. Helen Parish in South Gate, a predominantly Hispanic area of Los Angeles. He is shown here giving a first blessing to President Michael McLean.





Architect Erik Bootsma ('01) visited New Mexico to check on progress at the site of a new shrine to St. Kateri Tekakwitha for which he provided the Spanish-Colonial design. Under construction just south of Gallup, it is being built with all-natural materials and in keeping with Native construction techniques.



Just five years after graduating from Thomas Aquinas College, and only two after being elected to the City Council of Dunsmuir, California, **Matthew Bryan** ('15) was elected the city's mayor.

After graduating from the College, former Olympic ice-dancer Siobhan (Heekin-Canedy '18) O'Hara obtained an MA in law and diplomacy from the Fletcher School at Tufts University. She was recently appointed North American Regional Director at World Youth Alliance, an organization that promotes the dignity of the human person and builds solidarity among youth worldwide.



The Diocese of Manchester, New Hampshire, presented its annual St. Joseph Award for teaching excellence to a graduate of the College who couples his extraordinary devotion to his students with service to his country: Lt. Mark Forrester ('12). A math and theology teacher at Holy Family Academy, Lt. Forrester is also a member of the National Guard and was called up for active duty at a COVID-19 testing site just days after he had transitioned his school to online learning. Unfazed, he shouldered both responsibilities for the remainder of the academic year, often wearing fatigues as he conducted his remote classes from the testing site.



Carl Schmitt ('90) is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame Law School and a partner at Schmitt & Dillon Counselors at Law, which he co-founded with fellow TAC graduate Thomas M. Dillon ('91). Following the initial pandemic shutdowns, he worked closely with the Massachusetts Assistant Attorney General to re-open churches in the Commonwealth, allowing Bay State residents to safely assemble again in houses of worship. Commenting on his legal career, Schmitt says, "People often ask me whether the College prepared me for law school and the practice of law, and I tell them it was the best preparation I could have gotten because it taught me three seemingly simple but very important things: how to carefully read a text; how to seriously consider both sides of an argument; and how to really listen to others. I put what I learned at the College to work every day, and I am profoundly grateful for the education I received there."

The Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus — the world's largest Catholic fraternal organization, with more than 2 million members — elected **Patrick Mason** ('03) as its supreme secretary.

Commenting on his appointment, he said, "As part of my duties, I have to meet with bishops, correspond with members of the Church hierarchy, and



inspire and help form our men in the Faith. Being able to pull from my knowledge of the true, the good, and the beautiful, and being able to communicate the ideas that I found and developed at Thomas Aquinas College, has really helped me in all those regards."






