Meus Queridos Pai e Mãe,



I also know how much you have suffered by not having me at home, especially for Sunday lunches with Grandpa and the family. I know that you wanted me to

call more and to send you more pictures. But you endured all of that with great joy because you valued the good formation that I am receiving.



Pai, you have also seen me change. In some ways, I am becoming more and

more like you. I have left my parents' home early, powered through some of the difficulties of life, made mistakes (many), and learned from them. Although you have never said much, you have always been there for me in case I fell, and it was the comforting feeling of your presence that allowed me to shoot so high toward my dreams. I know it was hard for you, too, to see me leaving and changing — even drastically at some points — and coming back home with a lot of strong opinions about virtue, justice, the common good, and God.

Like Our Heavenly Father, you were there all the time, allowing me, in my freedom, to pursue my happiness. Both of you know very well how much Thomas Aquinas College has been life-changing and life-giving to me. But it would not have been possible without the immense effort that you two put into my formation. 

## Cardinal Burke: A Story of Providence

I want to express my heartfelt congratulations to the graduates of the New England campus for 2024. I was so happy to meet a number of you today and your parents. And I want to take this occasion, on which you have honored me, to say that, in honoring me, you are honoring the parents.

As a pastor of souls, my principal work has always been to serve families, and to serve parents in carrying out their call to procreate and educate children, who are the hope of the future. This, of course, is a participation in God's own work. Sometimes we speak about procreation, and we fail to mention that second word: It's always, in the Church's teaching, to procreate and educate. You good parents had at heart the desire to give your children the best classical education, and that is an education which begins and ends with God, Who is the source of all being, of all truth, beauty, and goodness. His plan is written in nature and, above all, on the human heart.

You couldn't have chosen — and I say this without any exaggeration — you couldn't have chosen a better institution of Catholic higher education than Thomas Aquinas College.

I would just like to share a little story with you, and I won't carry on, about how I came to be involved with the College. It

was through parents. I was a new bishop in the Diocese of La Crosse, Wisconsin, and there was a wonderful couple, Bernard — they called him Bernie — and Barbara

Johnson. Bernie is still living; Barbara was called home to Our Lord some years ago.

The Johnsons came to me, and they were very well formed in their Catholic faith, and they had a beautiful family, and their children were ready to go to college.

So, they asked me, "Can you recommend to us a good Catholic college?" And I began then — there already existed the Cardinal Newman Society — so I began to research it and look into it and, of course, very soon, at the top of the list was Thomas Aquinas College.

I soon got to know the College, and I was very privileged to know Founding President Dr. Ronald P. McArthur somewhat well, and to meet some of the other founders, too. We have Peter DeLuca here with us tonight — happy birthday! — and that was a great gift to me. I was invited to be the Commencement Speaker in California in May 2010, and that November I was created a cardinal.

So, it was in trying to serve parents that I discovered Thomas Aquinas College, and I have followed it very carefully ever since. After I was transferred to Rome, President Tom Dillon regularly came to Rome and would visit. The Lord called him home so suddenly in 2009, but he was a great man and, of course, he's had very good successors who have carried on this work.

Anyway, I thank you, parents, for having chosen this college for your young sons and daughters, and for your support of the College.

I am very pleased that I told you about Bernie and Barbara Johnson; well, one of the graduates this year is one of their grandchildren: Norah O'Brien. Her mother, Cecilia ('92), is a Johnson.

Well, thank you for your very gracious words. I am just so pleased to come to this new campus. To be here has been a great gift, and especially to be able to


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preside at the Commencement tomorrow. I thank God for that, and you can count on my continued support for Thomas Aquinas College, in union with all you good parents.





























## **Back to Campus**

### **Generational Wealth**

Class of 2028 Includes Children — and Grandchildren — of TAC Alumni

fter more than 50 years of pursuing its educational mission, Thomas Aquinas College has begun to show its age in the best way: welcoming third-generation students, with the grandchildren of its earliest alumni now reaching college age. This year, multiple freshmen are embarking on the same intellectual journey as their parents and grandparents before them.

"TAC has always been my one and only choice," says Nicholas Zepeda (CA'28). "It has been a part of my life as long as I can remember."

The eldest child of Wendy-Irene (Grimm '99) and Nick ('90) Zepeda, as well as the grandson of Rose (Teichert) and Dan Grimm (both '76), Nicholas grew up singing in the College's choir. Though he always wanted to attend Thomas Aquinas College, his decision was cemented during the High School Summer Program, where he discovered his love for Euclidean geometry. "Euclid makes so much sense!" he exclaims. "I always hated geometry before, but now I love it."

Nicholas isn't the only Zepeda to follow the family legacy. His second cousin, David Zepeda (CA'28), is also a freshman this year. David's grandparents, Anita (Grimm) and Andrew (both '79) attended the College, as did his parents, Julie (Shields) and Dr. Joseph Zepeda (both '04).

As a student at St. Augustine Academy in Ventura, California — a classical school founded and led by several TAC alumni — David made many friends who were also considering the College. "I visited the campus in January," he says, "and ended up choosing it for the great financial aid, advanced course of studies, and, honestly, the number of friends I would be going with."

Another third-generation student, Theresia Kuebler (CA'28), came to a similar conclusion at the family dinner table. The granddaughter of two mem-

bers of the College's first graduating class — Paula (Grimm) and Dr. Tom Kaiser (both '75) — Theresia always enjoyed the Socratic-style philosophy discussions that her father, Dr. Jared Kuebler ('03), led at family dinners. Homeschooled by her mother, Maria (Kaiser '03), she also attended monthly seminars at her homeschool co-op. "I realized how fun it is to talk about difficult but philosophically interesting questions," Theresia now reflects.

So, she attended the Summer Program, where she finally got to engage in the College's Discussion Method first-hand. "It was nice to be able to experience the classes myself," Theresia says, "rather than just listen in or hear about them from someone else."

As freshmen, these third-generation students are grateful to be continuing their families' legacies at Thomas Aquinas College and excited for the next four years. "I second-guessed myself at first, since I wasn't sure if I was making an unbiased decision," says David. "But I can already tell it was the right decision. I feel at home here, not just because of the proximity of friends and family, but simply because TAC is a tightly knit community, sharing the same ideals on a small and beautiful campus."

Nicholas loves that he gets to continue the study of Euclid he began at his Summer Program, as well as the other Great Books in the College's curriculum. "I was surprised by how much reading there is, even though my mother warned me in advance," he laughs. "I'm looking forward to growing in my ability to think about important topics, becoming a wiser person, and making lots of good friends."

Says Theresia, "It's amazing to think that my grandparents were in TAC's first graduating class. They still remember all the classes they took as freshmen, so it's really fun to talk to them about the same things they started studying all those years ago. I'm really excited about bonding with the other people in my class and growing in knowledge and love of God."

n the winter of 1994, I was a junior at Thomas Aquinas College, and Melissa and I had just had our fifth child. During the Christmas party that year, I cornered Bill Grimm, the father of 17 whose children and grandchildren have been a fixture of the College since its very beginning. I asked him for paternal advice: What can I do to help my children keep the Faith?

Mr. Grimm was a humble man and seemed perplexed by my question. But he finally shared two insights that have stuck with me fiercely over the years. He said Our Lord had been very good to him. And he said he thanked God every day for Thomas Aquinas College.

And so, while striving to trust in the goodness of God, it has also remained our fondest hope that, one day, our children

would be blessed to attend my beloved alma mater.

Our eldest child began her TAC education in 2008, and our youngest is now a freshman. Between those two beginnings,

9 of our 11 children have graduated from the College. And if Gianna, a senior, and Madeleine, the freshman, can make it through, then it can be said that the Brittains made Mr. Grimm's insight their own.

So now, 30 years later, if some earnest, wide-eyed young man asks me how he can keep his kids Catholic, I will echo the words of Bill Grimm: Trust in Our Lord's goodness, and, if possible, send your children to Thomas Aquinas College.

My children have embarked on diverse professional paths since their own graduations. They have pursued careers in education, pro-life advocacy, and family counseling. There is an electrician, some in real estate, and one in corporate management. Although they share a common education, they have proved more than capable of successfully blazing their own trails.

My wife and I never worried whether a Bachelor of Arts in

the Liberal Arts would prepare them to make a living. We were certain, from our own experience and the experiences of our friends, that the breadth, rigor, and timelessness of a TAC education would serve them well.

We are grateful to TAC for the unparalleled education it provides, but even more that it has helped our children keep the Faith. Instead of the intellectual arrogance that breeds skepticism, reading the Great Books carefully fosters a humility and confidence that enable one to uphold and defend the Faith. It is an education in which one's faith will grow.

But nothing is more evangelical than an authentic Catholic community, where the families are open to life, where faith and reason work in harmony, where the rich tradition that is our heritage is cherished and embraced. It is the people of the College who constitute the best bulwark against the madness of our age. It is because of their witness that I

returned to the Church while a TAC student, and it is their witness which has undoubtedly helped preserve the faith of my own children as well.

Finally, the College remains a place where one can truly discern one's vocation. Eight of my children have discerned that they were called to the married life. And while the eldest married her high school sweetheart, the other seven fell in love with devout Catholic classmates whom they were blessed to meet while students. The best marriages are true friendships, and the friendships born during the years at the College are ideally suited to last a lifetime.

Life is full of disappointments. But for my family, watching our children leave home for college has not been one of them. Melissa and I will be forever grateful for our children's education; for the community they, for a little while, made their own; and for the witness to the Faith that continues to shape their souls. It is safe to say that, just like Mr. Grimm, we thank God every day for Thomas Aquinas College.
